I. DESCRIPTION

This course is the first of six required composition courses for students in the BA in English and BA and "Profesorado" in English Teaching undergraduate programs. It provides hands-on practice on the basic principles of academic writing in English.

In this course, the emphasis will be on the essential elements of a formal academic paragraph to provide a solid basis for the progressive introduction of different genres in future composition and literature courses.

Sample paragraphs will serve as models for the students to construct original, unified, coherent paragraphs, to enrich their vocabulary, and to strengthen their grammatical skills. This course will be 100% on-site for I-2024 with a Low virtuality component.

II. GENERAL OBJECTIVE

Write coherent and logical paragraphs through the gradual process of pre-writing, writing, and revising by applying different discourse principles and organizational techniques.

III. SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

During this course, the students will

- **A.** define the audience, purpose, and topic of their compositions.
- **B.** organize their ideas through a formal outline.
- **C.** write syntactically correct sentences using a variety of grammatical patterns.
- **D.** apply grammatical principles related to verb forms, verb tenses, agreement, and

- word formation to their writing.
- **E.** connect ideas in their compositions using appropriate transition words and phrases.
- **F.** use vocabulary appropriate to the topic, audience, and type of writing tasks
- **G.** write well-structured one-paragraph compositions using the classification and comparison/contrast.
- **H.** apply the principles of mechanics (MLA format, spelling, punctuation, capitalization) in their compositions.
- I. develop proofreading and editing skills.

V. METHODOLOGY

This course will be face-to-face (on-site) during this semester.

Working individually or in small groups, students will (a) write for fluency, (b) read and analyze authentic/student-written texts, (c) engage in pre-writing, revising, and editing, (d) write compositions, (e) participate in discussions, and (f) do exercises on grammar, mechanics, and writing skills.

Compositions will be assigned on a regular basis both in class and out of class. Emphasis will be placed on autonomous learning; therefore, students will be expected to keep track of their own progress by paying attention to the strengths and weaknesses in their writing, based on feedback from the instructor and from peers.

Students are expected to do the assigned readings and exercises before class and to have an active participation during face-to-face sessions.

Mediación Virtual will be used as a repository of materials and documents, and, if requested, out-of-class assignments will be uploaded there.

Important note: When deemed desirable, instructors may use artificial intelligence (AI) for pedagogical purposes. Examples of such use could be analyzing a model to outline it, to add connectors, to structure it differently (e.g., from block to point-by-point organization), to turn it into a draft essay, to insert a missing topic sentence or revise the existing one, etc. Nonetheless, students should be very careful when resorting to AI for graded in-class or out-of-class assignments when the purpose of the evaluation is to assess learners' own ability to write a text. In such cases, the use of AI will not be tolerated, and content will be greatly affected. In this course, the instructor's ultimate goal is to aid the student in becoming a more proficient writer, not to review the work of AIs.

VI. EVALUATION

IMPORTANT: Students with a grade 8.5 or higher will not be required to do a second version. Exemption will be applied to students with a grade of 9 or higher in all assignments. **All above compositions / exams are written in class.**

VII. Evaluation Guidelines

1. All compositions assigned outside of class must be typed double-spaced, using Arial font,

size 12 and 1-inch (2.54 cm) margins.

- 2. In-class compositions must be written legibly on **ruled** 8 ½ X 11" letter size sheets.
- 3. The compositions should be approximately 175-200 words long.
- 4. All essays must follow the style of the Modern Language Association (MLA) format, latest version. If not so, they will not be accepted, and will be graded with a zero (0).
- 5. Students must follow the instructions given for both in-class and out-of-class assignments.
- 6. The compositions assigned outside of class must be signed by the student before being handed in to the professor.
- 7. All compositions must be <u>turned in on time</u>. In unforeseen situations, compositions prepared outside of class may be accepted 10 minutes after the start of the lesson. Other cases may be considered on the basis of the University regulations.
- 8. Unless instructed by the instructor, students **should not consult** external sources for writing their compositions.
- 9. When the instructor makes use of additional readings, students may use them in order to: (a) explore the possible areas of a topic that will be critically analyzed by the student in his/her composition, (b) study new vocabulary related to the topic, and (c) incorporate that vocabulary accurately in his/her compositions. The content of these readings should not be partially or totally summarized in the compositions.
- 10. **Plagiarism** will **not** be tolerated as it constitutes a very serious academic offense. Plagiarized work will receive a **grade of 0** and a serious misdemeanor will be filed in the student's record. From REGLAMENTO DE RÉGIMEN ACADÉMICO ESTUDIANTIL***

ARTÍCULO 4. Son faltas muy graves:

- g) Utilizar, con conocimiento de causa, documentos falsificados, para cualquier gestión universitaria administrativa, académica o de cualquier otra índole.
- j) Plagiar, en todo o en parte, obras intelectuales de cualquier tipo.
- k) Presentar como propia una obra intelectual elaborada por otra u otras personas, para cumplir con los requisitos de cursos, trabajos finales de graduación o actividades académicas similares.

ARTÍCULO 5. Son faltas graves:

- c) Copiar de otro estudiante tareas, informes de laboratorio, trabajos de investigación o de cualquier otro tipo de actividad académica.
- ARTÍCULO 9. Las faltas serán sancionadas según la magnitud del hecho con las siguientes medidas:
- a) Las faltas muy graves, con suspensión de su condición de estudiante regular no menor de seis meses calendario, hasta por seis años calendario.
- b) Las graves con suspensión de quince días lectivos a seis meses calendario.
